

Integrating SOAR Within the Sequential Intercept Model

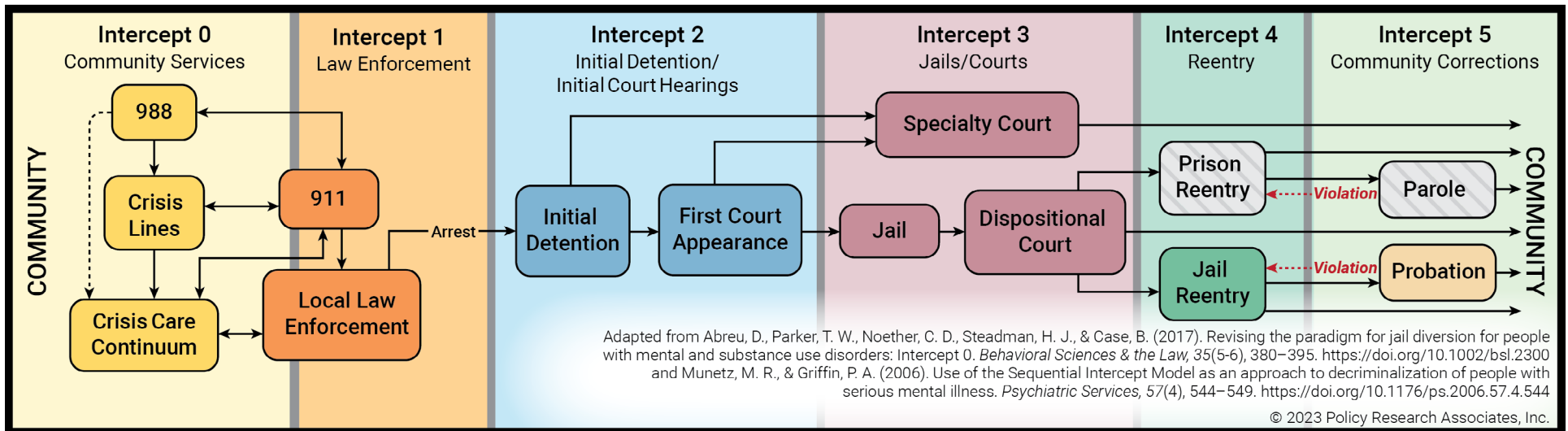
The SSI/SSDI Outreach, Access, and Recovery (SOAR) model, funded by the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA), increases access to the disability income benefit programs administered by the Social Security Administration (SSA) for eligible adults and children who are experiencing or at risk of homelessness and have a serious mental illness (SMI), medical impairment, and/or a co-occurring substance use disorder.

The Sequential Intercept Model (SIM) details how individuals with behavioral health conditions interact with the legal system. SOAR providers can use the SIM to divert individuals from the legal system and plan successful reentry.

Implementing the SOAR model in criminal legal settings shows promising results (Lupfer & Ware, 2019):

71%

71 percent of 731 initial SOAR-assisted pre-release applications were approved within an average of 99 days as of June 2024. Based on outcomes tracked in the SOAR Online Application Tracking (OAT) program.

INTERCEPT 0

Community Services

Independent Management Services, Minnesota: The Social Security Advocacy Supervisor, a SOAR provider, assists individuals with legal histories who struggle to maintain employment due to disabling conditions. They assist with applications to help stabilize income and prevent further legal involvement.

INTERCEPT 1

Law Enforcement

Network 180 and HOT Collaboration, Grand Rapids, Michigan: The HOT team in Grand Rapids comprises 2 peer recovery coaches, 2 police officers, and 2 firefighters. They work with the local Assertive Community Treatment (ACT) team to monitor and assist people experiencing homelessness. They identify SOAR-eligible individuals and connect them with the SOAR supervisor at Network 180, where they provide disability application assistance. If contact is lost, the HOT team aids with maintaining contact and transport.

INTERCEPT 2

Initial Detention/ Initial Court Hearings

Mecklenburg County Criminal Justice Services, Charlotte, North Carolina: SOAR providers support diversion from re-incarceration by linking individuals to Social Security disability benefits and other services (e.g., housing, health care), reducing the likelihood of re-incarceration and recidivism.

Marion County Mental Health Court Collaboration, Zero Hour Life Center, Ocala, Florida: The Mental Health Court case manager refers eligible participants to SOAR specialists at Zero Hour for SSI/SSDI application assistance, aiming to secure stable income and housing before completing the court program.

INTERCEPT 3

Jails/Courts

Sea Mar's SOAR and Clark County Jail Community Connections Pilot, Washington: Clark County's SOAR team works with discharge planners and reentry teams, begins the SOAR application process while individuals are incarcerated, and coordinates referrals to essential services for post-release support.

Eleventh Judicial Circuit Criminal Mental Health Project (CMHP), Miami, Florida: CMHP diverts people with non-violent misdemeanors and behavioral health conditions into community-based treatment. Participants are transferred from jail to a community-based crisis stabilization unit. Legal charges may be modified or dismissed, and participants are linked to treatment and housing services.

INTERCEPT 4

Prison/Jail Reentry

South Carolina (SC) DOC: SC DOC offers SOAR in prisons to help eligible individuals access SSA disability benefits, aiming for approval before discharge, with referrals made by prison clinicians.

Forensic Discharge Program (FDP), Virginia: FDP provides SOAR workers from community service boards to assist with case management and SOAR applications 90 days before release and continue support post-discharge until claims are finalized.

Jail Bridge Program, Zero Hour Life Center, Ocala, Florida: The Jail Bridge program provides SOAR services in 5 county jails, assisting individuals with completing disability applications before release to secure benefits and housing.

INTERCEPT 5

Community Corrections

Downtown Austin Community Court (DACC) (Homeless Services – ICM Program), Austin, Texas: DACC, a specialty court, works with the homeless outreach street team. DACC provides wraparound supports, including SOAR application assistance, linkages to stable housing, and resources to complete judicial requirements to prevent probation or bond violations.
